4th GRADERS - 1ST SESSION

DATE: AUGUST 5-8, 2007

CHECK-IN: 2:00 P.M. AUGUST 5, 2007

CHECK-OUT: 12:45 P.M. AUGUST 8, 2007

5TH GRADERS - 2ND SESSION

DATE: AUGUST 8-11, 2007

CHECK-IN: 2:00 P.M. AUGUST 8, 2007

WEBELOS CAMP FEES: \$100.00

All boys with full fee paid through the Pack before June 10, 2007 will receive a special camp incentive. Boys may sign up for camp after June 10th through their Pack leadership.

Boys now in the third (3rd) grade should attend session 1. This session is for boys starting their first (1st) year of Webelos.

MEDICAL RECORDS

All boys and adults attending camp **must** have on file, a completed 2007 Henderson class 1 personal health and medical history (Health form #34414). Please use only the forms given out this year. We will keep the forms. So please retain a clean copy.

The medical records should be collected by the Den Leader **to be brought to camp**. Before bringing the records to camp, the Den Leader should check to see that the health history is completed and signed by a parent and that boys with medications have the medication permission form attached.

MEDICATIONS

If parents wish a child to receive ANY medication during camp, the New York State regulation requires **written permission from your health care provider and parent. This includes all prescriptions and /or over the counter medications. This written permission must be renewed annually with the signature of the health care provider. Medications must be in original containers marked with boy's name and pack number. Prescription medications listed on physical and medication permission must be with scout on arrival. All medications are stored in the health lodge.**

REGISTRATION FOR CAMP

All camp fees should be collected by the Pack. The Pack should then draft one check covering all fees. They then mail the check along with the completed roster form to the Council Servicer. No refunds can be made for cancellations within one week of your arrival date. An exception will be made in the event of illness or extenuating circumstances and considered on a case by case basis. Refund requests must be in writing to the Servicer 1 week prior to the opening day.

CHECK-IN AT CAMP

To speed up check-in and to eliminate standing in line at camp:

1. Set a time when your boys are to meet you at camp.
2. When you have all of your boys, send one (1) Leaders to the check-in table to sign in the entire den. We don't need to see each boy.
3. If you have boys or adults that still owe fees, bring those fees to the check-in.

CAMP SECURITY

For the health and safety of the camp community, visitors are required to sign in at the camp office upon arrival. Scouts are sent by parents to camp under the recognized supervision of registered leaders and parents from the Cub Pack of his hometown. Release of campers to persons other than parent, guardian, or registered leader will require a signed permission by parent or guardian.

LEADERSHIP

Each Pack must provide at least two (2) adult Leaders for every 8 boys. **NOTE:** for each three (3) boys attending Webelos Camp, your Pack can send two (2) adult Leaders at no charge.

For any extra leaders or parents wishing to attend, the cost is \$25.00 per person per session – OR - \$7.00 per person per day. Remember that parents can be used toward your leadership ratio as long as at least one (1) registered adult leader is present.

Because of insurance requirements, the children of adults attending, who are not Webelos Scouts, will **not** be able to stay in camp.

Please list the adults who will be attending camp with your den by name on the roster sheet. Be sure to indicate which nights they will be staying in camp. Also, please indicate Webelos moms on the roster. This helps in planning tent requirements.

PRE-CAMP PLANNING MEETING

Prior to Webelos Camp, we will hold a planning and information meeting for den leaders and parents that wish to attend. It will be a must that at least one (1) leader from your pack attend this meeting. We will be going over the camp program, the schedule, and all other details, so don't miss out.

Our Webelos Camp planning meeting will be held on Tuesday, July 17, 2007 from 7-8 p.m. in the camp-dining hall. Please put this date on your calendar now!! Pre-orders and a full summer inventory of items will be available 6:30-7 p.m. for Webelos Leaders.

CAMP STORE

The camp store will have on hand a limited end of the summer inventory during August. If you wish to insure that patches, t-shirts, cups, neckerchiefs are available, be sure to fill out pre order forms by May 10, 2007. Boys and leaders will receive 1 patch free.

PROGRAM

The Webelos Camp program is designed to provide a fun filled camping experience for a Webelos Scout and his den. Hiking camp trails, sports, activity badge fun, cooking outdoors and meeting new friends are all part of the Scout Camp experience.

FISHING

A very popular activity at camp during free time. Boys need to bring poles and tackle. We will have worms available.

WEBELOS LEADER INFORMATION

1. You are considered part of the staff and have all attendant privileges and responsibilities. This includes supervision of any and all Scouts in camp matters. Of health and safety.
2. Coffee in the kitchen.
3. Hot water, showers shaves at the shower house. Hours 6:00 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. an adult must be present when showers are in use.
4. **Report all injuries to the Health Lodge. . .including your own.** Visits after 9:30 p.m. must be accompanied by an adult.
5. Takes a verbal roll call at least four (4) times a day. If a Scout is missing, **do not start your own search. Contact the Camp Director or Assistant Camp Director or Program Director immediately.**
6. Cut no live trees.
7. Do **not** rake ground cover in the campsite.
8. Give list of tents or platforms that need repair to the Commissioner on Monday morning.
9. Guests for meals, in writing, at least 24 hours in advance.
10. Dining Hall:
 - . . .must have adult at head of table
 - . . .no seconds
 - . . .make sure food gets to everyone the first time
 - . . .encourage manners
 - . . .don't waste food
 - . . .pass leftovers from table to table
11. Scouts and Leaders must sign in and out of camp at the AD building. What I can get from the Quartermaster:

HENDERSON SCOUT RESERVATION

INFORMATION

1. All youth protection guidelines of the B.S.A. are to be followed. Report any case of suspected child abuse immediately.
2. **All injuries should be reported to the Health Lodge, no matter how minor.**
3. **No flames in tents!!!**
4. Scouts and adults **are not to be transported** in the back of trucks or in trailers.
5. Special parking arrangements can be made through Camp Director or Camp Commissioner for health or physical reasons.
6. Boys may **not** leave camp without the permission of their Webelos leader. Everyone must sign out and sign in at the Administration building.
7. The buddy system should be used at all times in camp. This is especially important when fishing or hiking camp trails.
8. No one may use a knife or bow saw without leaders permission and instruction upon arrival.
9. Campers are expected to attend all campfires and camp wide events.
10. Campers may **not** use the telephone without written "ok" of Webelos Leader.
11. The staff area is off limits to Scouts.
12. Uniforms should be worn at evening meals and programs.
13. Taps is at 9:30 p.m. Lights out and no talking are required.
14. Inspection of troop sites will be taken daily.
15. Pack leaders may bring lanterns and canopy tarps if they wish.

WARNING CAUTION

RABIES IS A VIRAL DISEASE THAT ATTACKS THE CENTRAL NERVOUS SYSTEM. IT CAN BE CARRIED AND TRANSMITTED BY ALL WARM-BLOODED ANIMALS. INFECTED ANIMALS WILL EVENTUALLY DIE.

THE DISEASE CAN BE AND IS TRANSMITTED TO HUMANS THROUGH THE BITE OR SCRATCH FROM AN INFECTED ANIMAL.

SUMMER CAMP IS A “HIGH CONTACT” SITUATION WITH TWO POTENTIAL RABIES CARRIERS: THE RACCOON AND THE SKUNK.

THE RACCOONS AND SKUNKS ARE NIGHTLY VISITORS TO THE CAMPSITES IN THEIR SEARCH FOR AN EASY SNACK OF CANDY AND OTHER “JUNK FOODS”.

YOU CAN REDUCE THE POTENTIAL FOR CONTACT WITH THESE CARRIERS BY DOING THE FOLLOING.

1. DISCOURAGE THE BRINGING OF COOKIES, ETC. FROM HOME.
2. DISCOURAGE THE STORAGE OF CANDY ETC. IN THE CAMPSITE.
3. KEEP THE CAMPSITE FREE FROM ALL TYPES OF FOOD WASTE (TAKE GARBAGE TO THE SHED DAILY).
4. DON'T DISPOSE OF COOKOUT DAY SCRAPS IN THE WOODS. TAKE ALL GARBAGE TO THE SHED.
5. DON'T LET YOUR BOYS PUT OUT FOOD TO “BAIT” THE RACCOONS AND SKUNKS.

WE CAN CUT DOWN ON THE POTENTIAL FOR CONTACT WITH RABIES IF WE DON'T GIVE THE CARRIERS A REASON TO BE IN THE CAMPSITES.

AVOID CONTACT WITH WILDLIFE. ANY ANIMAL THAT DOES NOT ACT “NORMAL” SHOULD BE AVOIDED. IT IS PROBABLY SICK. ANY SUCH ANIMAL SHOULD BE LEFT ALONE AND THE ANIMAL’S LOCATION SHOULD BE REPORTED TO THE CAMP DIRECTOR OR PROGRAM DIRECTOR IMMEDIATELY.

CAMP MEDICAL PLAN

Rabies:

1. If you are scratched, bitten, or get saliva from a suspect animal:
 - a. wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water.
 - b. report to the Camp Nurse immediately.
 - c. have Troop Leader contact Camp Director.
 - d. have someone keep track of animal until Camp Ranger or Director can capture the animal.
2. Camp Nurse will re-wash the wound, then:
 - a. send the individual for medical treatment.
 - b. contact the NYS Health Department.

Bat Rabies:

Rabies is a viral infection of mammals, usually transmitted by an infected animal’s bite.

Bats rank third in number of rabies cases in the United States, behind raccoons and skunks.

Are rabid bats a threat to human health? Yes. Since 1980, more people in the U.S. have been infected with a bat rabies strain than any other strain of rabies. The only human rabies deaths in New York State over the past 40 years were a result of exposure to bat rabies virus.

Are all bats rabid? No. Most bats are healthy and contribute to our environment in many ways, particularly by controlling insect pests.

Where do the most common bats roost? The big brown bat and the little brown bat, *Myotis lucifugus*, are common house bats that roost during spring and summer in attics, behind shutters and in other sheltered areas of human dwellings and outbuildings (barns, garages, etc.) These bats leave the roost at dusk to feed on flying insects, and may return during the night for a period.

Wow can someone tell whether a bat has rabies? Rabid bats may show abnormal behavior, such as outdoor activity during daylight; rabid bats may be grounded, paralyzed, or may bite a person or animal. Not all rabid bats act abnormally, but bats that do are more likely to have rabies.

RABID BATS RARELY ATTACK HUMANS. BUT, BECAUSE RABIES CAN OCCUR ANYWHERE AND BECAUSE RABIES CAN BE FATAL, STRICTLY AVOID DIRECT CONTACT WITH BATS. EACH CONTACT WITH A BAT SHOULD BE PROPERLY MANAGED BY HEALTH AUTHORITIES.

How should an encounter with a bat be managed? First, determine if a human, pet, or livestock may have had contact with the bat. Contact is considered to be a bite, scratch, or other physical contact. If the possibility of contact exists, capture the bat, without touching it and without damaging its head. Immediately contact your local health agency to arrange for rabies examination of the bat. If the test results are positive for rabies, or if the bat cannot be captured or brought to the lab oratory

immediately, post exposure treatment must be administered as soon as possible to those with known or suspected contact. If you are sure that no human or domestic animal contact with the bat has occurred, the bat can be allowed to leave on its own, or if it is in your home, it can be released. If you are certain there was no contact while capturing the bat, release it outdoors, away from populated area and preferably after dark.

EMERGENCY PLAN

Emergency Procedure:

- * Always contact the CAMP DIRECTOR.
- * If not available, contact the following: PROGRAM DIRECTOR OR CAMP COMMISSIONER OR CAMP NURSE
- * These are the people who run the emergency operations, and they will contact the COUNCIL SCOUT EXECUTIVE, fire, police and ambulance as needed.

The EMERGENCY CENTER is the Health Lodge – all runners will report there.

The FIRE CONTROL CENTER is at the kitchen.

The FIRE EQUIPMENT CENTER is located in the area in the rear kitchen.

IMPORTANT

Always protect LIFE first, material and equipment are second. Equipment can be replaced; there is no substitute for one's life.

Severe Storms: (Wind, hail, lightening, etc...)

A. If warning is given in time, move all campers and staff to the Dining Hall. Take a head count by Troops and report the count to the EMERGENCY CENTER.

B. Steps to take if there is NO WARNING:

TROOP SITE:

1. Hold all campers in site.*
2. Have them lie under beds, face down.
3. Take a head count before and after the storm.
4. If a runner must be sent, SEND TWO.

WATERFRONT:

1. Get everyone out of the water.
2. Hold all campers in one group.
3. Make a buddy check right away.
4. If time permits, take everyone to the storage building. If not, have everyone lie down in an OPEN AREA with their hands over their heads.
5. If a runner must be sent, SEND TWO.

ON THE TRAIL:

1. If possible, get to an OPEN AREA. If not, get everyone on the ground (in a hollow or low spot in the terrain) face down. Be sure everyone is away from dead trees.
2. Keep your campers together. Take a head count before and after the storm.
3. If a runner must be sent, SEND TWO.

ALL OTHER PROGRAM AREAS IN CAMP:

1. Keep your group together and move them toward the nearest building.
2. Take a head count before and after.
3. If a runner must be sent, SEND TWO. If a runner must be sent out, have them report to the **EMERGENCY CENTER HEALTH LODGE** in pairs.

Accidents And Injury:

A. Major Accident

1. Contact and report to the Camp Nurse at the Health Lodge.
2. Contact Camp Director.
3. When reporting accidents, give good account of what happened so proper material and people are gathered to handle a give situation.
4. Always send TWO people to the **EMERGENCY CENTER** – Health Lodge.
5. Personnel running the **EMERGENCY CENTER** with contact the Council Scout Executive and other proper authorities.

B. Minor Accidents And Injuries:

1. Report all injuries, no matter how minor they may be, to the Camp Nurse.
2. Always send TWO people together. NEVER send the victim by himself.

C. Health Emergency: (two or more people with stomach disorder, measles, chicken pox rash, etc., constitute a health emergency).

1. Contact the Health Lodge.
2. Contact the Camp Director, who will then contact the Health Supervisor and Council Scout Executive.

D. Lost Person:

1. Contact the Camp Director.
2. Give details:
 - a. where last seen.
 - b. what personal equipment they might have with them.
 - c. full name, camp address, home address.
 - d. accurate description of lost person.

E. Lost Swimmer:

1. Contact the Camp Director.
2. Contact the village where the camper lives.
3. Waterfront will stop as soon as a lost swimmer is suspected.
4. The waterfront will be cleared of all persons unless otherwise directed by the Camp Director.

F. Fire Call:

1. Hold all persons in respective area when siren is blown.
2. If siren blows two single blasts, send fire warden from each Troop site to fire equipment area at Dining Hall.
3. If more than one staff man is in area, send one man to the fire equipment area as soon as siren blows.
4. All clear is one short blast on siren.

G. Extreme Heat Conditions:

1. Adjust programs to limit or cancel activities requiring extended or excessive physical activity.
2. Give frequent breaks in program to give Scouts time to “cool-down”. Allow time for and require that Scouts take in additional fluids. Water coolers located at:
 - a. Dining Hall
 - b. Camp Store
 - c. Visitor’s Latrine
 - d. Drinking fountains in all campsites

H. **Earthquake:** The major concern in dealing with earthquakes is the danger of being buried by or hit with falling building debris.

1. Procedure:

- a. if you are in a building: try to get outside (away from building).
- b. if you are unable to exit the building: get under a table, etc. or get in a doorway to afford protection from falling debris. Cover head and face with arms to offer protection from flying glass, etc.

I. **Blood Borne Pathogens:**

1. Assume that all patients are infected.

- a. always use protective rubber gloves (provided in all first aid kits).
- b. if CPR is required always use protective one-way mask.

Camp Safety Plan:

1. Contact with all wild animals is to be avoided. This is especially true of skunks, raccoons, and bats.
2. Contact with stray dogs and cats should be avoided.
3. It is the camp policy that NO food or garbage be left in the campsite overnight.
 - a. Food should be placed in Webelos Leader's car or taken to kitchen for storage.
 - b. All garbage should be secured in the garbage shed before wildlife.
4. Campers and staff will be instructed:
 - a. do not attempt to capture or handle sick or orphaned wildlife.
 - b. avoid animals acting in a strange or unusual manner.
 - c. avoid and be suspicious of daytime activity in raccoons, skunks, or bats. Report should be made to:
 1. Camp Director
 2. Camp Commissioner
 3. Program Director
 4. Camp Nurse
5. A copy of DEC handout will be given to all Leaders and Camp Staff.

IN CASE OF FIRE

Report fires to the KITCHEN. If kitchen is empty report to Health Lodge.

Report by Radio. . .it is faster

RADIOS ARE LOCATED IN:

Health Lodge, Nature Lodge, Store, Craft Lodge, Waterfront, Rifle Range, and Archery Range.

WE NEED TO KNOW:

Location of fire

Type of fire (brush, tent, building, etc.)

If the SIREN SOUNDS:

Emergency "UNIT 14" will be called on the radio.

If you are in a program area:

The staff member in the area will keep your boys there and make a report to fire control.

If you are in your campsite:

Take a quick accurate count and report to:

Fire Control

The nearest radio

If no radio is available send two messengers to fire control (kitchen)

Your report should be as follows:

In _____ site. There are _____ boys and _____ leader from Troop #_____.

Note: The number reported should not include the two messengers. They will be counted at the report site.

KEEP ALL MOVEMENT TO A MINIMUM UNLESS OTHERWISE DIRECTED.

MAKE MAXIMUM USE OF RADIOS.

Fire Wardens do not report unless:

You are in your troop site.

You are in an area with no staff or radio.

Radios are out of service.

If your wardens are not with you, appoint two more.

Always make a quick accurate head count.

After the first count take a roll call to make sure that all boys are yours.

Protect life first everything else later.

GUIDELINES FOR USE OF CHEMICAL FUELS

NO FLAMES IN TENTS AT ANYTIME!

Dangers include fire, asphyxiation

Kerosene, gas, liquefied petroleum may be used in permanent buildings.
(latrines) and outdoor lighting.

“Lighting and refueling of gasoline and liquefied petroleum lanterns (and stoves) must be done under the supervision of or by a responsible adult who is knowledgeable in safety precautions in their use. This applies also to high adventure trips and tours”.

Health & Safety Service, BSA

FUEL STORAGE:

Storage and issuance of all chemical fuels is controlled by a responsible adult, and will be under lock and key in Scout Camps.

Empty liquid petroleum cylinders may explode when heated. Take them home, dispose of them by burying.

Liquid fuels for starting any type of fire is prohibited. This includes damp wood, charcoal and ceremonial fires. Use solid-type starters.

For safety reasons, boys may not be involved with the handling and storage of gasoline.

SPACE HEATERS

Which use chemical fuels consume oxygen and can cause asphyxiation. Use only in well ventilated areas.

The use of any chemical fuel lantern or stove for tours high adventure, or council activities, is permitted only with the express permission of the Council Health and Safety Committee.

CAMP SECURITY

For the health and safety of the camp community, visitors are required to sign in at the camp office upon arrival.

Scouts are sent by parents to camp under the recognized supervision of registered leaders from the scout troop of his hometown.

Release of campers to persons other than parent, guardian, or registered leader will require signed permission by parent or guardian.

PROCEDURES FOR INTRUSION OF AN UNAUTHORIZED PERSON AT THE HENDERSON SCOUT RESERVATION

1. Periodic review of security concerns of the site.
 - Leaders will be instructed to “stop in” their campsites throughout the day on a regular basis.
 - The commissioner staff will be trained in the following procedures. They are able to walk around camp during program hours.
 - Staff can also assist in watching for anything out of the ordinary. The directors are all equipped with radios to call the Administration Building Reservation Director at anytime.
2. Training for staff and campers when appropriate, about steps to take in such instances.

The following steps will be shared with the staff during staff training week, with the leaders during the leader meetings and the Senior Patrol Leaders during their meetings.

- A. All visitors must report to the administration building to sign in and sign out. This book will be monitored by the director.
- B. If an unauthorized person is suspected, notify the closest program area. All program areas are equipped with radios. The area director should make radio contact with the administration building/reservation director and stand by to give or receive further instructions.
- C. Once the Camp Director is notified of the situation, he will proceed to the area with the program director or another adult to question the destination of the individual in question.
 - Leaders will be instructed to train their scouts on the above procedures. Most importantly, stress to the scouts NOT to approach the person and to find an adult immediately. The buddy system should be strictly enforced at all times.

OTSCHODELA COUNCIL AND BOY SCOUTS OF AMERICA SMOKE FREE POLICY

It is the responsibility of the Boy Scouts of America to protect the health and safety of the young people in our program.

It is the policy of the Boy Scouts of America that leaders should not use tobacco products in any form in the presence of youth members.

In addition, extreme care should be exercised to provide smoke-free environments for all scouting participants.

Therefore, all buildings or facilities under control of the Otschodela Council are to be designated as non-smoking facilities. Smoking outside entrance/exit doors is not permitted at any location. In addition, all scouting functions, meetings, or activities should be conducted on a smoke-free basis with permitted smoking areas located away from all participants.
